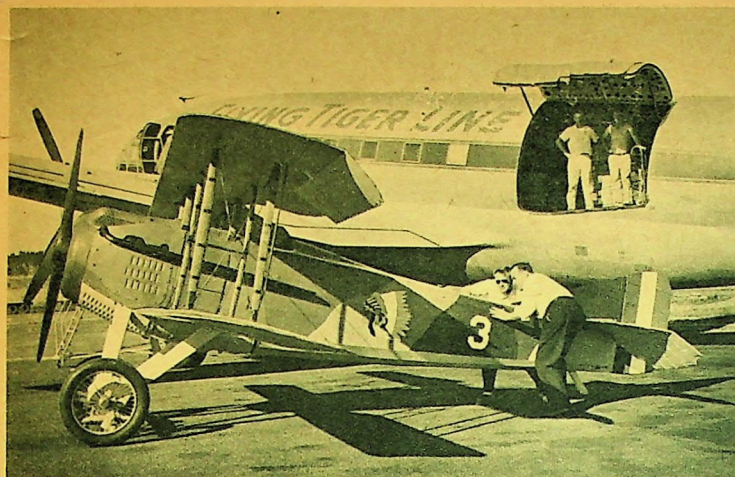

Wishful Thinking?

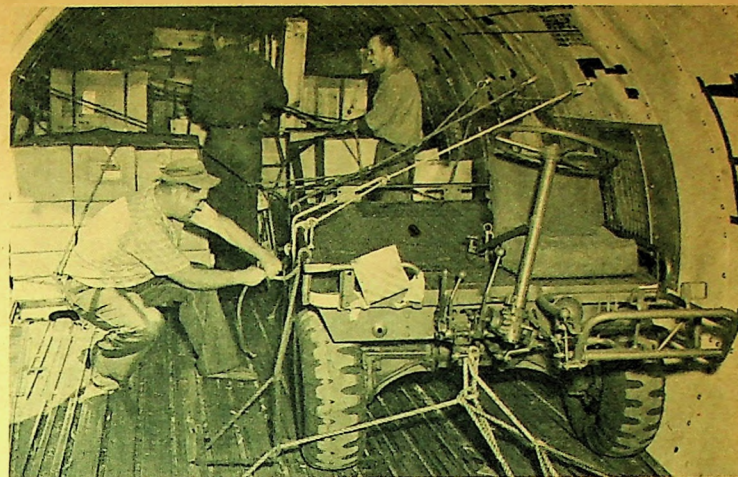

AUSTRALIAN-TYPE ORCHIDS arrive at Wayne Major from the Coast for delivery to Detroit wholesale florists.



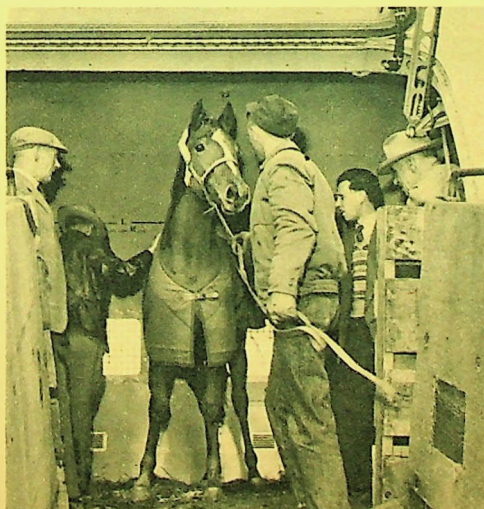
